May 28, 2017 7th Sunday of Easter



I have always been enthralled with the stories of adventurers and pilgrims who have travelled to different parts of the world so different from my own. With the development of modern transportation in the early 20th century which made travel so much more possible, newspaper journalists and adventurers shared with a much larger public, their experiences to places only imagined in the preceding years. Our pilgrimage will begin in Thessaloniki where we will arrive on Monday. St. Paul's arrival there was met with some significant opposition: Thessaloniki was a significant Roman city, but had a strong Jewish center. Paul's preaching proclaimed Jesus as Messiah, whose rising from the dead was a 'parousia' or a "royal appearance," flying contrary to the vision of the Jews who resisted His recognition and the vision of the Romans who had shortly before that, declared that the emperors were deities and where, within the common culture, being divinized—(being recognized as gods). Paul and his companions are quickly driven out from Thessaloniki, and his letters to the community there remind them of God's tender care for them, but it also contains the vision of resurrection which confounds the Jewish temple leaders because it adopts the Pharisees position of resurrection wherein the dead in Christ will rise first—that those who have died, will be caught up in the air with the Lord... Paul and his companions escape, but withdraw a short distance away to Berea, and it is there that there is peace for some short while. We will move on to Philippi and Kavala (Neapolis in Paul's time), and then to visit some of the sites associated with ancient Macedonia—there will be the opportunity to preach and celebrate at the Bema of St. Paul in Veria. (the 'bema' is a sort of runway that moves out from the sanctuary area of a temple that allows one's voice to be heard in the crowd—this would have been the venue for the kind of preaching that Paul would have done among the larger gatherings). We marvel that the Acts of the Apostles tells us of 3, 4, and 5 thousand people being added to the number of disciples in a day—with that kind of exposure to the crowds, the companions of Paul would have been kept busy baptizing and welcoming people into the Body of Christ....
